This Semester has begun with yet more amazing art projects!


In drawing and Painting 11/12 students are learning about composition, value and mark-making through the creation of charcoal still life drawings.

Be sure to check the changing displays in the D wing and in our new gallery space in the main foyer to see the amazing artwork created by Belmont's talented artists!





## THE BELMONT MUSIC DEPARTMENT





## Belmont's Theatre on the Edge

After a very successful and educational Winter production of the 24 Hour Play Project, Belmont's Theatre on the Edge has set its sights on this year's Spring production of Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead. Director, Sean Cowie and the amazing ensemble cast of Belmont thespians are currently in rehearsal and hard at work to produce this intelligent and hilarious play written by Tom Stoppard.

The play will run in the Belmont Theatre May 22nd-May 25th; doors open for evening performances at 6:30 PM and curtain rises at 7:00 PM. The show closes with a matinee performance at 2:00 PM, Saturday, May 25th.

Here's a quick synopsis of one the most relevant and inventive plays of the last 50 years:

Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, often referred to as just Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, is an absurdist, existential tragicomedy by Tom Stoppard, first staged at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in 1966. The play expands upon the exploits of two minor characters from Shakespeare's Hamlet, the courtiers Rosencrantz and Guildenstern.

While comparisons have also been drawn with Samuel Beckett's Waiting for Godot, the action of Stoppard's play

takes place mainly "in the wings" of Shakespeare's most famous play, with brief appearances of major characters from Hamlet who enact fragments of the original's scenes. Between these episodes the two protagonists voice their confusion at the progress of events occurring onstage without them in Hamlet, of which they have no direct knowledge.

This play is certain to entertain and challenge both actors and audiences alike. Come out to support Belmont's Theatre on the Edge!
